A Note...

In our first reading, God says through Zechariah: "they shall look on him whom they have thrust through, and they shall mourn for him as one morns for an only son . . . a first-born." That prophecy could be fulfilled in no other than Jesus, the Word made Flesh, the Only-Begotten Son of God, the Crucified.

The day of the Messiah indeed came, with an outpouring of the Spirit. Yet it was a saving event not only for Jerusalem but for all people. Both Jews, and Gentiles could become "children of God," in St. Paul's stunning phrase. Now, "There is neither Jew nor Greek. . . slave nor free . . . male and female . . . if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's descendant, heirs according to the promise."

In light of today's readings, the Gospel is poignant. Jesus asks His closest friends, "who do you say that I am?" Jesus then reveals to them, as Zechariah had foretold, that the Messiah must be "thrust through" and killed and mourned before the spirit would come forth on Penecost.

The day has indeed come. Yet still we long for its fullness, and so we pray to God in the Psalm: "for you I long! For you my body yearns; for you my soul thirsts, Like a land parched, lifeless, and without water"

From Our Pastor

There is "no greater mistake in spiritual matters than to force others to follow one's own pattern," warned Saint Ignatius of Loyola. What draws you into a fuller and richer spiritual life may be very different from the pull felt by another faith-filled person on his or her spiritual journey toward a deeper relationship with God.

What is your spirituality type? Take the VISION spirituality quiz and consider your results an invitation to know yourself better and explore different forms of prayer, worship, meditation and ways of living. https://www.vocationnetwork.org/articles/show/63

The types of spirituality:

PATH OF INTELLECT (Thomistic prayer): About 12% of the population follows this path, using the syllogistic method of Saint Thomas Aquinas known as scholastic prayer.

PATH OF DEVOTION (Augustinian prayer): The majority of saints are of this spiritual temperament as well as 12% of the population (half of those who go on retreats or belong to small faith groups).

PATH OF SERVICE (Franciscan prayer): More than half of churchgoers practice this spiritual type --- but far fewer of this type come to church regularly.

PATH OF ASCETICISM (Ignatian prayer): More than half of churchgoers practice this type of prayer. It involves imagining oneself as part of a scene in order to draw some practical fruit from it for today. This spirituality goes back to the Isralite way of praying in 1000 B.C. in which one remembers and immerses oneself in an event and thus relives and participates in the event in a symbolic way.
